

We do this by publishing high-quality books and peer-reviewed papers, supporting independent research with awards and grants, running public lectures and conference programmes featuring leading experts, developing innovative educational projects, and providing a home for two sector-leading archaeological research and engagement projects, the Scottish Archaeological Research Framework and Dig Itl.

Our values of collaboration, opportunity, transparency, research excellence and equality are central to everything we do as a charity.


